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Sewels from Jules

Sermon excerpt "Dusty Feet" (Luke 10:1-11, 16-20)

Ok, let's get our feet wet.

Really, that's what this scripture is all about, the cleaning of our feet, shaking off the dust and honoring those feet as they move forward one step at a time. I know, you're thinking that I am trying to sneak in a foot washing service, and it certainly would be a treat in this hot weather! But there is a theological reason for foot washing as well as a history of cultural practice. Foot washing is not just a Holy Week ritual that seems to serve as a looming threat to everyone in need of a pedicure or with foot anxiety. Foot washing appears throughout the scriptures (examples) and was a common sign of hospitality. Be mindful that sandals were the usual footwear and feet were far more prone to get dusty in the dry Middle East climate than in our geographical context; nonetheless, when a traveler or guest would enter a home in biblical days, they would either be offered a basin of water and a towel to wash their feet or a servant would be sent to wash them. On occasions, the host washed the feet of their guest.

For those of you with foot issues and a squeamishness regarding touching other people's feet or your own, you would be required to abandon them very quickly if you wanted to be a respectful member of the community.

And, in this scripture, Jesus is sending out seventy of his followers in a dry run - a dusty run - to prepare the way for his ministry. He pairs them up, and gives them instructions for how to share the Good News with strangers, trying to prepare them for the inevitable rejection along the way: slammed doors, sneers, challenges, avoidance, being invisible. While we may be struggling with a decline in church attendance, Jesus and his followers were struggling with the creation of the church, starting a movement where there was not one. In anticipation of the rejection that his followers would encounter, he does describe it as "being sent like lambs into the midst of wolves" Jesus tells them this, "But whenever you enter a town and they do not welcome you, go out into its streets and say, "Even the dust of your town that clings to our feet, we wipe off in protest against you."

And, so, with the mandate to wipe the dust of their feet when not welcomed, the missionaries are launched. This "launching" is called the Limited Commission, not to be confused with the Great Commission when Jesus sends his disciples to share the Good news with ALL people; the Limited Commission has a different purpose, it's not about ALL people, it's a commissioning only for the Israelites, and a test, if you will, to determine who is willing and worthy among them to receive Jesus's message. A more challenging target audience, you could say, and challenging enough that this story is mentioned in all four Gospels with the assumption that the Good News of Jesus Christ would not be greeted with enthusiasm.

Sounds familiar....we all travel in circles where the Good News of Jesus Christ is not greeted with enthusiasm. Sometimes at our kitchen table. Jesus never said that following him was easy.

Their gesture of leaving behind their foot dust was a deliberate one; it was the custom of pious Jews to wipe off their feet and leave the dust behind after they traveled through a "mixed" territory, to separate themselves from the unclean. It's not a very kind gesture. If any of us traveled through a neighborhood in Worcester that was rather unlike our own neighborhood, then cleansed ourselves at the border and left our dirty residue, that would be viewed as rather....rude. And, for Jesus to suggest that his disciples reclaim this dust ritual is a dramatic reversal.

There is a Jehovah's Witness community on the edge of my town, and I passed the Mormon temple on route 2 the other day, two American Christian churches that have a strong practice of visiting door to door in pairs, to spread the message of Jesus. I wondered if this was a hallmark scripture for them, and I quickly found that Joseph Smith, founder of the Mormon Church, did quote and practice "shake the dust off your feet." In fact, the controversy was whether or not the dust shaking should happen visibly, so the judgment should be seen.

Through a series of revelations from God in the early 1830s, Joseph Smith clarified that the dust shaking should be done in secret "lest thou provoke them." That makes sense, seems respectful, but his next revelation is a bit troubling to not only me but other Christians, as he instructed his missionaries to shake the dust off their feet and "l be filled with joy and gladness and know this, that in the day of judgment you shall be judges of that house, and condemn them, and it shall be more tolerable for the heathen in the day of judgment, than for that house."

That's a lot of power for us, to be able to condemn others who may not want to receive the Christian message, nor receive it from us at that moment. So, that becomes the core question for me, and for us, in this "Spiritual, but not religious" era. WHEN do we shake the dust off our feet? We are called to share God's love persistently, and there are some who may never be ready for the message....is it our place to judge, try again or quietly move on, cleaning our feet much later?

If you want to know a little secret, this scripture is one of my mantras every time I fumble or fail at something, and I am a master at making mistakes! "Ok, Julie, wipe the dust off those feet and move on..." I remembered a sermon on this scripture from high school, and I latched on to the idea that this is a scripture about failure, about falling down and then getting back up again. As I read it again now, decades later, I notice that Jesus never mentions failure and certainly when this scripture wraps up joyfully once the seventy return, the followers don't seem to harp on their "failures" This scripture is much more about resilience, perseverance, staying on course with a faithful message and a practice of loving hospitality. This scripture is a worthy recipe for how to stay somewhat sane in these very reactive times, a three step method to loving, lived faith for the long haul.

I think it's beyond time to get our feet wet.

I have a friend with a lovely beach house in Provincetown, and there is always a large square bucket of water on the front porch, and a nubby mat, so you can step in and allow all the dust and sand to stay behind so you can enter the house clean. The mat dries and massages. So, maybe this story is less about casting judgment by wiping off all the dust, and more about an opportunity to be clean, forgiven, and walk each step with newness. And maybe we don't worry about shaking the dust off our feet..... but focus more on offering a basin of water to others.



A note from Carolyn Gagnon on her volunteer work with refugees:

My interest in helping people displaced by war was most likely instilled in me at a young age when my Dad had me watch WW2 documentaries more times than I can count. As a Polish American, the horrific acts inflicted on millions of innocent people was a lesson to hold not just in my memory, but in my heart as well. I believe that apathy towards the suffering of refugees only perpetuates the evil and pain inflicted upon them by the dictators in our world.

Recently I have had the opportunity to help refugees by volunteering with Welcome Alliance for Refugee Ministry, WARM. Since October I have helped with many apartment set ups and collecting donated household items for the 400 Afghan refugees who came to Worcester since September 2021. It has been a great learning experience to learn about their customs, holidays, and values. I also have worked closely with a mother and son from Sudan who arrived in the United States in November. I have advocated for her by navigating very complex and often contradictory refugee assistance programs. Comprehending how to obtain assistance and fill out necessary forms is difficult as an English speaking college graduate who was born here. Compound that scenario with a refugee trying to learn English who doesn't understand how are systems work and you can see how frustrating a refugee's life can be.

This summer we are hosting a 15 yr old Ukrainian refugee student who is attending Woodstock Academy in Connecticut. We took her with us on an already planned vacation to Canada. Ironically, we had more trouble reentering the United States than we did getting into Canada, due to a problem with her visa. It was a unique experience to be detained at the border of the country we were born in!

I believe Americans are blessed with so much, clean drinking water, job opportunities, education, healthcare, and a strong military. Most Americans can not begin to imagine being invaded by an enemy and leaving their homes behind to find a safe place to live.

The scripture lesson in Matthew 25: 31-40 states my belief well: " I was hungry and you gave me food. I was thirsty and you gave me drink. I was a stranger and you welcomed me."
